#### 4. In addition to need; why should you be considered for this scholarship?

The faster and more you pick, the better your pay. In a family of six, it was best to work yourself to the point of exhaustion, in order to help provide for our family. At the age of ten, I started working in the local fields to help my mom with the house bills. Working there, I realized I had to push for more—for my mom and siblings. I do not want her in the stinging-hot-sun for the rest of her life. She made sure my siblings and I had everything we needed for a future. I made sure this did not go to waste.

My name is Sarai Aldama-Vaquero. I was born in Gainesville, FL to Elia Cerro, my mom. I grew up in a family of six and raised by a single mother of Mexican descent. Coming from an immigrant family has many challenges.

When I was in second grade, my father was deported, and my life was forever changed. Growing up, my mom worked all the time—she still does. When times are a little rougher, I help my mom with the bills. I make sure that my siblings don't go without food, I don't want them to ever see an empty fridge. When I was a young, an empty fridge was normal. We lived paycheck to paycheck and hunger was not unfamiliar to us. As I got older, life improved. My siblings and I were able to help my mom with the bills and the daily-work around the house. My mom taught me to work hard. She taught me to set my mind and to not give up. When I feel like giving up, I can hear her say "lo tienes mija, no te rindas" (you got this, don't give up). I constantly push myself in school. I take honors, AP, and dual-enrollment courses to further my education. I participated in sports, school clubs, organizations, and community events. These experiences

have taught me to always strive for more, to appreciate what we have and to navigate difficult situations.

My family cannot afford to install internet at the house. This became an issue my ninth-grade year—it's still an issue—due to I started online classes. In spite of this, I did not push my mom to cut even more costs for this, I found another way. To this day, I spent countless hours at my local library. It's open Monday through Fridays from 10:00 AM to 6:00 PM. After the library is closed and on the weekends, I park in the parking lot and work on my dual-enrollment assignments. In regard to my education, I always made it my priority and found a way to get things done. No excuses!
